

VII. REVIEW AND ASSESSMENT

196. Viewed in terms of economic growth, 1971-72 has been a year of great challenge. Nearly every aspect of economic activity came to be subordinated to what was obviously the central task: succour of the refugees from Bangladesh, and the liberation of that nation, claimed an overwhelmingly large share of the nation's resources. But this challenge which India faced in 1971-72 and overcame has had its own reward: the sense of unity and purposiveness which it has ushered in augurs well for the hard economic tasks which await the nation. Even during the year, despite the burden of the new responsibilities, the economy was maintained on a reasonably even keel and the momentum of the Plan was maintained, although at a moderate pace. At the same time, developments during the year could not but have led to a shifting of priorities in the short run. As the nation returns to a more exclusive concern with economic growth and social justice, the nature of the problems besetting the economy therefore remains substantially what they were at this point of time last year.

197. Moreover, the strain caused to the economy by the burden of the refugees and the need to mount a major defence effort has had its own impact. The extent of this strain cannot be spelled out in terms of the draft on current resources alone. The wear and tear of the economic infrastructure as well as the stresses and strains on the social fabric, particularly in the eastern parts of the country, are no less significant and yet cannot be readily quantified. All this will have implications for the economy, some of which can unfold only with the passing of time. Since the nation is also committed to contribute, within the limits of its capability, to the reconstruction of Bangladesh, a lessening of the strain on resources cannot be envisaged for the present.

198. Recent events, including developments in the international scene, have also brought to the fore the task of a careful husbanding of the country's external economic accounts. Whatever the manner in which the more immediate problems are answered, the country will have to pursue, with a greater order of resoluteness than hitherto, the course of self-reliance. The requisite burden of additional sacrifice, without which self-sufficiency will remain a distant goal, has to be equitably distributed. This would call for a greater adaptability to new norms and values, as also for a willingness for raising the level of efficiency and lowering the level of unit costs in different spheres of production.

199. Perhaps what is most important at the present juncture is the need for a major step-up in the tempo of planned economic development. This is necessary for reactivating the industrial sector as also for achieving a greater measure of self-reliance and social justice. The tasks referred to in the preceding section as being essential for export promotion, import substitution and cost-saving can be accomplished only through a process of integrated planning which ensures that resources grow and are dovetailed

to each other in the optimum manner. The same is true if a major impact is to be made on the well being of the less privileged sections of society or the relatively backward regions of the country.

200. The task would, moreover, involve an institutional reorganisation affecting, in some degree or other, the structure of income distribution as between different social groups. An essential ingredient of the policy for lowering unit costs, it has been mentioned earlier in this Survey, would be a better system of distribution of essential goods, including strategic raw materials. Such a re-ordering of the distributive arrangements would however mean a lower rate of return for the intermediaries engaged in trade. Although a number of State agencies are engaged in internal and external trade, till now they have not had any appreciable impact on trading efficiency, if the latter is to be judged by costs and margins. One possible reason would be that, by and large, intermediaries have been retained as agents of the State trading organisations. In any genuine endeavour to raise distributive efficiency, the role of such intermediaries would need to be increasingly constrained.

201. The sacrifice that is called for would also affect certain groups of producers and consumers. The country has made magnificent strides in the production of foodgrains, particularly wheat, so much so that by now one major plank of self-reliance, namely, independence from imported food, has been realised. And yet, it is only fair that the cost associated with this achievement is kept under continuous review. For example, if the current levels of procurement and issue prices are to be maintained for wheat, the subsidy which the national exchequer will have to bear, on account of both current distribution and buffer stock of foodgrains, may assume formidable proportions. The cumulative strain of this commitment could lead to adverse developments elsewhere in the economy. The problem of adjustment in foodgrain prices is linked with that of increasing industrial efficiency as well, since food forms a major proportion of the weightage in the cost of living index. The practical difficulties in implementing a shift in policy cannot however be ignored. In a society given to democratic institutions, if unnecessary turmoil is to be avoided, basic changes in policy should be engineered largely through discussion and persuasion.

202. The problem of prices, in a sense, remains pervasive. During the year, because of exogenous developments impinging on the budget and also because of the compulsion to enlarge the flow of credit to the hitherto neglected sectors, monetary expansion of a considerable order has taken place. The general price level could not but be affected by this development. In the case of commodities bedevilled by market imperfections and where there is, in addition, a net shortage, speculators have tried to take advantage of the situation. Without stable prices, there can be little prospect of stability in investment decisions, nor of any significant rise in exports. Even the demand for imports is often induced by the high prices of domestic products: undertakings, including those in the public sector, have been enjoined to economise on costs, and it is natural for them to try to shun inputs which are domestically available but whose unit cost is high.

203. The exercise of monetary policy in such circumstances becomes a difficult operation. At one end is the need to speed up credit for the productive sectors and neglected groups; at the other, there is the constraint set by the trend of prices. But precisely because of this predicament, the need to economise on credit, wherever it is possible, for example, in inventory management, is all the more important. Nor can it be seriously disputed that credit is sometimes diverted for speculative ventures. An effective monetary policy could therefore lead to greater managerial efficiency, as much as to price stability.

204. Market imperfections apart, prices tend to be unstable largely because production in the vital sectors—for example, in commercial crops—lags behind and there is a general paucity of resources. Technological gaps and structural deficiencies, which impede growth, are fairly well known; super-imposed on these is the lack of investible funds which could stimulate expansion and development. As the experience of the last few years has made clear, a significant acceleration of activity even in the private industrial sector will hinge upon an initial and sustained stimulus being provided by Government investments. During the year now ending, plans for expanding the scale of investments in the public sector could not take off because of the extra-ordinary situation the country had to face; despite a stupendous resource effort, public savings as a proportion of national income have in fact declined. This is a disturbing trend.

205. Despite halting investments the targets of income growth indicated in the Fourth Plan have been more or less attained during the past few years, mostly because of the excellent performance in agriculture. The run of good harvests in successive years, however, cannot go on forever. Whether the economy possesses enough in-built defences with which to absorb the shock of a sharp deceleration in the rate of growth of agricultural output is more than what can be said at this stage. The level of capital formation therefore has to be raised and conditions created for a substantial expansion in the industrial sector, public as well as private. While institutional, organisational and procedural matters are important in this connection, the major obstacle would still appear to be the depressed level of savings, more particularly, public savings.

206. The Direct Taxes Enquiry Committee have recommended a number of reforms in the corpus of direct taxation. The scope of indirect taxes also is getting increasingly narrowed because of the difficulty in devising a system of incidence which would leave the general price level unaffected and impinge relatively less on the weaker sections. The surplus from public enterprises continues to be meagre; perhaps the performance of these enterprises cannot be expected to improve significantly unless investments, both by way of installation of balancing equipment and by expansion, have increased.

207. The flow of private savings for industrial capital formation would seem to be about equally unsatisfactory. The shift in the terms of trade between agriculture and industry in favour of the former in the course of the past decade provides one explanation of this phenomenon. While internal generation of funds in the industrial sector has been affected by this factor, there is no evidence that agricultural savings are being largely

transferred back for industrial investments. With the process of agricultural taxation lagging behind, rural savings are not being adequately canalised through the conduit of public savings either. The affluent segments of rural society need, therefore, to be increasingly drawn into the tax orbit.

208. Certain other factors inhibiting growth in the industrial sector mainly relate to procedures. There is also the problem of containing the growing volume of unemployment and under-employment in regard to which not much advance seems to have been made in recent years. Procedural questions are being continuously gone into, and a number of special projects have been initiated to provide short-term relief to the unemployed and the under-employed. In all such matters, marginal adjustments here and there are unlikely to make much of a difference. The thrust of the effort has to be wider and deeper, calling for a qualitative shift in the scale of investments. Once investible funds are available, minor adjustments can be taken care of; it is the fiscal barrier which needs to be pierced first.

209. A major breakthrough in the fiscal field also hinges on the evolution of sound Centre-States relations. Some of the continuing problems concerning agricultural and industrial growth too involve problems of regional allocation of resources. Such issues raise their head even in respect of the pricing and distribution of essential commodities. Questions relating to terms of trade as between regions, sectors and commodity groups will have to be satisfactorily resolved before the fiscal dilemma can be answered in clearer terms.

210. The management of the balance of payments will pose a similar challenge. No doubt it is the internal structure of costs and production planning which in the ultimate analysis determines a country's ability to do without foreign credits; but there are questions about attitudes and adaptations too. Even as the commodity pattern of trade changes over time, there could also be a changing destinational pattern of our foreign trade. This might necessitate structural adjustments in the domestic field, and even call for a reconstruction of our views on certain trading techniques and practices. These changes and adjustments have to be anticipated. There is always a cost in negotiating a course of transition, but its impact can be minimised provided the ground has been laid with care.

211. To sum up, as we enter into the final two years of the Fourth Five Year Plan, many fundamental problems implicit in accelerating greatly the tempo of development come once again into sharp focus. There is in the country now a general consensus in favour of our major objectives of eliminating poverty, inequalities and dependence on external aid in the shortest possible time. There is a recognition also that these objectives can only be achieved by a mutually reinforcing thrust forward in a number of directions, in industry no less than in agriculture, in export promotion as well as import substitution and in resource mobilisation as also in bold and new initiatives for making an impact on problems such as unemployment, mal-nutrition, urban overcrowding and lack of basic amenities in cities and in the rural areas. But a concerted attack on all these inter-related problems requires also a determination to impart a much greater degree of resilience to our economic institutions and policies. The objectives of price stability and greater competitiveness in external markets cannot, for example, be

achieved without a greater degree of control over the machinery of distribution and without improvement in industrial relations. Mobilisation and conservation of resources requires improvements in tax administration as also in the procedures for proper evaluation of investment propositions. The management of the country's external accounts will require a sufficiently flexible attitude towards evolving new patterns of trade. The machinery for control will need to be continually reviewed to ensure that the basic objectives are achieved at a minimum cost in terms of interference in day-to-day management decisions. The evolution of appropriate Centre-State relations is crucial not only in regard to resource mobilisation but in respect of a proper utilisation of available resources and for speedy removal of regional inequalities as well. The effective implementation of many of our socially oriented schemes of development in rural areas would depend again on the quality and dedication of local leadership. The challenge of rapid economic development thus cannot be met merely by sound economic management. It has to be met also at a much deeper social, political and institutional level.
